- Have more secure exchange of data between higher education institutions and easier compliance with General Data Protection Regulation
- Make the next programme more environmentally friendly by moving away from paper based processes






Transformational potential of European Universities Joint long-term strategies impacting all levels of the institutions



- Systemic, structural and sustainable impact

- Specific trans-disciplinary challenges (challenge-based approach) and aim to become champions in fields of expertise
- Transnational and transdisciplinary teams
- Institution wide, going beyond individual departments and faculties

- Pool courses/programmes/modules together
- Flexible, modular, personalised curriculum
- Accumulation of micro-credentials leading to a full degree




- Inclusive co-creation governance model: student, staff and stakeholder involvement

Geographical balance

- √ 17 pilot European Universities for brain circulation across EU
 - HEIs from 24 EU Member States + Norway
 - > All selected European Universities cover at least 3 out of 4 European regions
 - Around 50% cover all European regions



A diverse spectrum of higher education institutions

- New partnerships
- Already cooperating partners have reached out to new partners
- Around 90% have between 5 and 8 partners, on average 7 partners
- * 35% include an applied sciences, art or technical university
- Small, medium-sized and large institutions involved
